

**Transcript of Testimony of Tracy White
Before the Thompson County Grand Jury
September 2, 2004**

Appearing: Assistant State's Attorney Carl Marsh
Tracy White

Q [Mr. Marsh]: State your name.

A [Witness]: My name is Tracy White.

Q: You are testifying today under a grant of transactional immunity, is that correct?

A: Yes.

Q: Before coming before the Grand Jury, you gave me what is known as a proffer, that is, you told me your history as well as your statement concerning the case under investigation. Is that correct?

A: Yes

Q: I am going to show you what has been marked as Grand Jury Exhibit Number 2. Do you recognize that document?

A: Yes. It is a copy of the proffer statement I gave you earlier.

Q: Are the statements contained in that proffer true, correct, and in your own words?

A: Yes. I swear that they are totally true.

Q: I am going to read the statement to you. If there are any mistakes in the statement, or if you think I misread the statement, stop me and we will correct the error. Do you understand that?

A: Yes.

[Whereupon the Exhibit was read aloud by Assistant State's Attorney Carl Marsh.]

Q: You did not stop me as I read the statement. Is the statement which I read to you true, correct, and in your own words?

A: Yes. Just like I said.

Q: Thank you. I have no further questions.

Q [By a Grand Juror]: I have a question. Do you know the combination to your cousin Jaimie Bianco's safe?

A: Safe?

Q: The safe in Jaimie's office at Bianco's Pizza.

A: Absolutely not.

Q: Do you know the date that Pappy's Pizza was established?

A: No.

Q [By a Grand Juror]: What did you do at Pappy's Pizza?

A: Well, after I moved back from New Mexico, Mom, Uncle Buck and I ran the place. Jaimie wasn't living in Marshall and Uncle Buck needed my help. I cooked, cleaned, ran the register, made deliveries, met the customers - you name it. When Uncle Buck would go on vacation or out of town for business, he had me manage the place. I was Uncle Buck's right hand. We were a team.

Q [By Mr. Marsh]: Are there any more questions? Seeing no hands, the witness is excused.
