

Stipulated Testimony of Tom Holt

My name is Tom Holt. I was a supervising parole officer for 15 years, before my retirement on February 1, 2004. I presently reside in Cabo San Lucas, Mexico. Just before my retirement, I supervised 20 parole officers (full and part time) who worked in Thompson County, State of Marshall. Three times I received the Commissioners Award from the Police Department for my work with parolees.

I was Jaimie Bianco a/k/a Jaimie White's parole officer since Jaimie's conviction for drugs, in 2003. Jaimie was previously adjudicated a juvenile offender for drugs. I know about Jaimie's four drug arrests in 2001, none of which resulted in convictions. Jaimie was a tough case because, while I knew Jaimie was in trouble with the law, I saw real potential for rehabilitation as an honest, hard-working citizen. After Jaimie's dad was killed on June 26, 2003, I made unannounced inspections of Bianco's Restaurant and Jaimie's home at least three times a month. This was two more times a month than was required.

I spent the extra time on Jaimie's case because I believed Jaimie was going through a hard time after Buck was murdered, Jaimie's mother dying from a drug overdose, and taking on the extra pressure of running a business. This is a classic formula for trouble. I wanted to intercept and help Jaimie avoid trouble and address it right away. I helped Jaimie get a waiver, on hardship grounds, to own and manage the restaurant.

In every visit (all unannounced), I never found any evidence of drugs or gambling, whatsoever. After Buck White's murder and the name of the restaurant was changed to Bianco's Restaurant and Sport's Bar, I heard neighbors complain about the changes at the restaurant. On three occasions, I brought in a drug dog and went through the restaurant and Jaimie's house. Like me, the dog found nothing. I

am convinced that Jaimie was conforming to all of the conditions of the supervised release.

I also knew Jaimie's family. I can attest that they constitute a great support system. I played football with Jaimie's uncle, Ronald White, in high school. Ronnie was the quarterback and I was an offensive lineman. Since my high school days, I have been to Pappy's, and later Bianco's, both as a customer and a friend of the White family.

On January 1, 2004, following my report to Judge Cranston, the judge who placed Jaimie on supervised release, Jaimie's supervised release was terminated early as satisfactory.

I have read the above statement and swear under the pains and penalties of perjury, that it is true and correct to the best of my memory.
