

STATE OF MARSHALL CRIMINAL CODE

AIDING AND ABETTING

18 M.R.S. Section 2

Whoever commits an act in violation of the laws of the State of Marshall, or aids, abets, counsels, commands, induces or procures its commission, may be punishable as a principal.

ARSON

18 M.R.S. Section 844(a)

844(a). Arson. Whoever without authority intentionally or knowingly burns or destroys or damages by fire or explosive any building, structure or motor vehicle, having a value of more than one thousand dollars, shall be imprisoned for not less than three and not more than twenty five years, and may also be fined up to the greater of one hundred thousand dollars or the cost of repairing or replacing any property that is damaged or destroyed. A person who has no prior conviction under this section shall be eligible for probation for a term up to six years. A person who has previously been convicted of violating this section shall not be eligible for probation, and shall be sentenced to a minimum mandatory term of imprisonment for not less than six years.

ARSON-TERRORISM ENHANCEMENT

18 M.R.S. Section 844(b)

844(b). Terrorism Enhancement. If the violation of section 844(a) constitutes an act of terrorism as defined by these statutes, the violator shall be sentenced to a minimum mandatory term of imprisonment for not less than twenty-five years up to and including life imprisonment, and shall not be eligible for probation, early release, or parole.

TERRORISM – DEFINED

18 M.R.S. Section 2-16 [Terrorism]

2-16. Terrorism. Terrorism consists of any offense involving . . . [arson]. . . if the person committing such offense intends to intimidate or coerce a civilian population, or intends to influence the policy or decision-making process of a governmental body by

intimidation or coercion, or intends to avenge an action taken by a governmental body.
